- Taking Ownership: 2 Samuel 12:13 vs 1 Samuel 15:24
 - Culpability:
 - I Have Sinned: 1 Samuel 13:12 (David); 1 Samuel 15:24; 13:12 (Saul).
 - David didn't complicate the matter. Saul always made excuses.
- **Repentance**: 2 Cor. 7:5-12
 - Changed Mind:
 - Broken Hearts: Psalm 51:1-17 (David).
 - There's no point in worship if our hearts haven't changed.
 - Changed Behavior:
 - Sackcloth: 1 Chronicles 21:16 (David); Jonah 3:5-10 (Nineveh).
 - Sometimes, our actions don't align with our words. We go about our lives as though nothing has happened.
 - Longevity: 1 Kings 21:25-29 (Ahab)
 - Even Ahab repented, but it was short-lived.
- Cleansed: 1 Corinthians 6:9-11
 - Sin:
 - You Know: John 13:1-11 (The Apostles).
 - Judas knew what he was doing.
 - Forgiveness: Matthew 27:3-5 (Judas); John 21:15-19 (Peter).
 - Jesus didn't want Judas to die because of his sin. Jesus isn't looking to crush us, which is what a broken spirit does.
 - Proverbs 15:13 A glad heart makes a cheerful face, but by sorrow of heart the spirit is crushed.
 - Psalms 34: God is for you, brethren
